5. Assessment Question:	How did the Hotel de Paris present an element of grandeur to a growing mining town in the Rocky Mountains?
6. Contextual Paragraph	<p>Often called a bit of France in the Rocky Mountains, the Hotel de Paris brought a touch of France to Georgetown through the eyes, baking, and sommelier experience of George Dupuy. Dupuy was a Frenchman who came here to mine in Georgetown and Silver Plume, and received severe injuries in an accident in the local mines. Nursed back to health by local townspeople and given a small bakery to work in, he took the second chance to build his fortune.</p> <p>By expanding the bakery and building a hotel, he became one of the best known hotel proprietors in Colorado with a taste for fine wine, food, and accommodations. His hotel reflected that same taste with extensive interior details and exquisite furnishings, exterior wrought iron railings, design work on his building, and even a Statue of Liberty on the roof.</p> <p>Today, the Hotel de Paris remains in Georgetown as a sign of the earlier days of mining and is a museum for Colorado visitors, giving them a glimpse of what Georgetown hoped to be in the late 1800's.</p>
7. Connection to Historic Preservation	<p>Listed in the National Register of Historic Places in 1970, the Hotel de Paris is a cornerstone building on the downtown main street of Georgetown, Colorado, and was listed as a contributing member of the Georgetown Historic District in 1973.</p> <p>The Hotel de Paris is noted for its significance in architecture and for its role in the</p>





	commerce of the Georgetown community during the turn of the century. It remains in its original location and is largely unchanged. The exterior architecture reflects the tastes of the original owner and is French in nature with masonry, some stucco, and with features that are reminiscent of a French provincial building.
